OAKWOOD CONFEDERATE MONUMENT

*--to honor the over 400 Confederate Veterans buried in
Oakwood Cemetery, Austin, Texas*

The Maj. Geo. W. Littlefield Camp #59, Sons of Confederate Veterans has undertaken a project to erect a monument to those who served the Confederate States of America and are buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Austin.

We have procured a section in the cemetery 25 ft. by 30 ft. on which we have erected an obelisk of gray granite 10 feet tall. The stone for the monument is from the Stone Mountain, Ga. area. Plans include a meditative bench where visitors may rest and reflect on the service of the men honored, as well as a protective and decorative curbing around the perimeter of the plot.

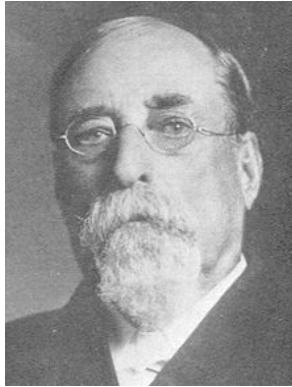

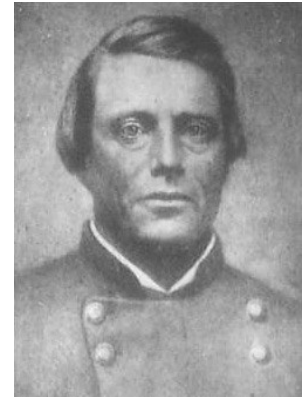

The Confederate veterans pictured here are among the over 400 veterans buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Austin. They include Generals and other officers as well as enlisted men who fought in the cavalry, the infantry and the artillery.

Many of them were men who believed in their cause and took up arms against an invading foe. Those not killed in the war returned home and made a life in what was left of their state. Many prospered and became some of Texas' most prominent leaders.

As members of the SCV, we believe that all these veterans buried in Austin's Oakwood Cemetery deserve a monument to honor their service.

The Original Sons of Confederate Veterans Major George Washington Littlefield camp was formed in 1898, two years after the founding of the National Sons of Confederate Veterans. In 1977 the Camp was re-chartered under the name Maj. George W. Littlefield Camp #59. The camp has continued to grow and now has over 60 members. The camp is very active in re-enactments, living history demonstrations, parades and grave marker dedications. Members are responsible for headstone cleaning and Confederate documentation in Oakwood Cemetery in Austin. In 2002 the Camp placed a monument to Confederate Medal of Honor recipient Pvt. William Guehrs in Waldeck, Tx.

Members of The Major George W. Littlefield Camp #59 are proud of their Camp, their Camp's namesake and his contributions to The University of Texas and the City of Austin. They are dedicated to fulfilling the Charge given by Gen. Stephen Dill Lee in New Orleans, La. in 1906.
